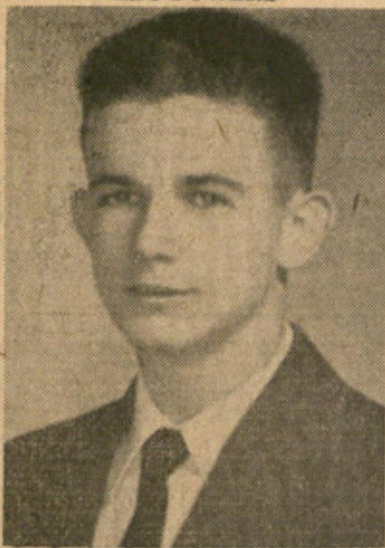

On February 2, Coenraad Steyn, his wife, Petra, and two children Coenraad Jr. age 1 year, 3 months, and Louise 3 years old, arrived at Freed-Hardeman College, Henderson Tennessee, from Pretoria, South Africa. They will remain at FHC for two years and he wants to attend a senior college after finishing here.

Brother Steyn left his mother, father, two brothers and one sister in South Africa. He plans to return to his native country and preach.

Before he came to the United States he was an embalmer, funeral director, and gymnasium instructor. He can speak five languages — English, Afrikaans, Sesotho, Hollands, and Dutch.

When asked what he thought of America and Freed-Hardeman his reply was, "It is a very fine place and I believe we are lucky and blessed to be able to study in a place like this where we are given an opportunity to speak our will and find the Bible answer. The Americans are blessed abundantly both spiritually and physically."

Brother Steyn was a member of the Dutch Reform Church before he was baptized by Brother Don Gardner about two years ago. Since then he has been doing personal work with Brother Gardner among the people of South Africa. His parents are also members of the church.

Before he left for America he was preaching for one Afrikaans service a month. "The church is growing in Pretoria," stated Brother Steyn.

## The Christian And Segregation

Often times we have grasped the great principles of Christianity and have applied only the ones that will benefit us in some way. Some of these principles that we have accepted as truth never actually enter our way of thinking because from youth our minds have been clouded by prejudice.

Humanity has always experienced "race problems". As we think of race, our minds generally are occupied with the Negro people. This in itself shows failure to grasp the entire situation.

By what process of logic do we accept Asiatics, Europeans, Indians, Mexicans and regard the Negro as taboo to society?

It would help a great deal if all of us would strive to look beyond our limited environment and try to understand the multiplicity of differences in the human family and God's interest in the salvation of all. Do not confine our thinking to one city, county, state, or country. Look at humanity and see that there are no "pure" races. Too many times we feel that we are "the" race, when in reality we are being

more egotistical than realistic.

Those who have formed definite views regarding race problems usually can be divided into three groups. Some believe all segregation should be abolished immediately; others believe that it should be done away with as rapidly as people are able to become adjusted without serious effects; and still others feel that Caucasians are no better than Negroes, but feel that the two groups should be separated with equal facilities.

The first view would be wholly inconsistent with the Christian approach. Teaching is the only answer, and not coercion. People cannot and should not be forced to regard others as equals—such compulsion would deny them freedom of choice which is fundamental in Christianity and Democracy.

This problem should be prayerfully considered. The steps of Jesus crossed the way of a Samaritan woman; Paul declared we are all "one in Christ." James tells us men are not to be despised because of earthly circumstances.

A failure to regard others correctly will cause us to transgress the royal law: "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."

## Food For Thought

During the Lord's Galilean ministry, as recorded in Matthew 9:36, he had compassion on the multitudes. Being moved by the condition of the people he said: "The harvest is plenteous, but the laborers are few; pray ye therefore the Lord of Harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest."

The Lord realized the people were in dire need of salvation. He understood the Father's means of saving souls by teaching. Pathetic conditions always moved the Lord's tender and understanding heart.

To understand that great masses of people are without Christ is to understand our responsibility. The world must be sown with the seed of God's truth if men are to be led in the correct path spiritually.

The church Jesus established was certainly given the divine obligation of carrying God's power to save — the gospel — to all.

Whether it be the sandy-headed boy on the corner by the drug store, or the Arab in a foreign desert, the Gospel is needed.

The pathetic part of the Lord's statement is not so much the great harvest as it is the lack of workers. Far too few is the number and far too little is the desire to tell the old, old story.

We have, to a great extent, commercialized our preaching. Our aim seems to be in doing something others would consider "courageous" or "great". The individual Christian responsibility is no longer a part of us. The church in the first century made phenomenal gains because the church realized its responsibility and didn't try to delegate the preaching to someone else.

Let all of us determine to more fully grasp our opportunities for saying something for Christ and pray that the Lord of harvest will send forth labourers into his harvest.

## "And Follow Me"

Jesus said in Luke 9:23: "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, daily, and follow me." In this reading there are five divisions to be considered.

First: "If any man will come after me". God gives man the power of choice. He does not force any one to worship him. Man worships God because he loves him. The apostles, in the days of old, chose to follow Christ without offering any excuses. Some make a dangerous decision not to follow Christ. Let us decide in our youth to follow him who died for us.

Second: "Let him deny himself". When one chooses to follow Christ he must deny himself of many earthly pleasures. He cannot love the world and have the Father love him. (John 2:15) He must make a sacrifice of himself to the Lord. (Rom. 12:1) Let us deny ourselves of our own sinful pleasures and present our bodies a living sacrifice unto the Lord.

Third: "Take up his cross". Every individual has a cross of responsibilities to bear. He cannot be relieved of them. (Gal. 6:5) God made man responsible for

many things, we must fulfill God's law. Every man who chooses to follow Christ will have a cross of trials and burdens to bear. One cannot serve God without being persecuted in some way. The apostles were persecuted unto death.

As individuals, we are to bear each others burdens. (Gal. 6:2) Let us take up our cross of responsibilities and bear it to the best of our ability.

Fourth: "Daily." We must deny ourselves, and take up the cross "daily" before we can faithfully follow Christ. Christianity is not a seasonal affair. It plays a vital part in our everyday life. We cannot pay for Christianity on the installment plan. We must strive to be a Christian every day.

Fifth: "And follow me". If we follow our Lord it is necessary that we put him first. (Matt. 6:33) The apostles quit their work and followed Christ immediately. Let us be like the apostles and quit making excuses. The closer we follow Jesus, the more we'll be like him. Hear his word as he says: "If any man will come after me, let him take up his cross, daily, and follow me".

Carolyn Sullenger, junior from Flushing, Michigan, "Colleges on the same level as the whites should be provided for the Negroes. I think such an arrangement would prove to be the most satisfactory."

Raymond Harville, a senior from Moulton, Alabama, "For me, yes, but no because of the prejudice that will be aroused among whites in attending school with a Negro and keep some from coming who would otherwise like to."

Lorene Estes, a junior from Dixon, Tenn., "God is no respecter of person."

Maxine Belue, senior from Columbus, Mississippi, "We're no better than they are, and they deserve an education the same as we."

Donald Smith a junior from Rockford, Illinois, "Yes, because the Declaration of Independence says all men are created equal. I think they have as much right to a Christian education as a white person."

Bob Jolliff, junior from Hanford, California, "Yes, because people cannot be true Christians and show prejudice or discriminate between races."

Martel Pace a junior from Flint, Michigan, "Yes, because Negroes when well educated, are mentally equal with the whites."

Winston Brackeen a third year student from Athens, Alabama, "I believe they should be allowed to attend Christian colleges."

Gentry Morrow, a junior from Paragould, Arkansas "Yes."

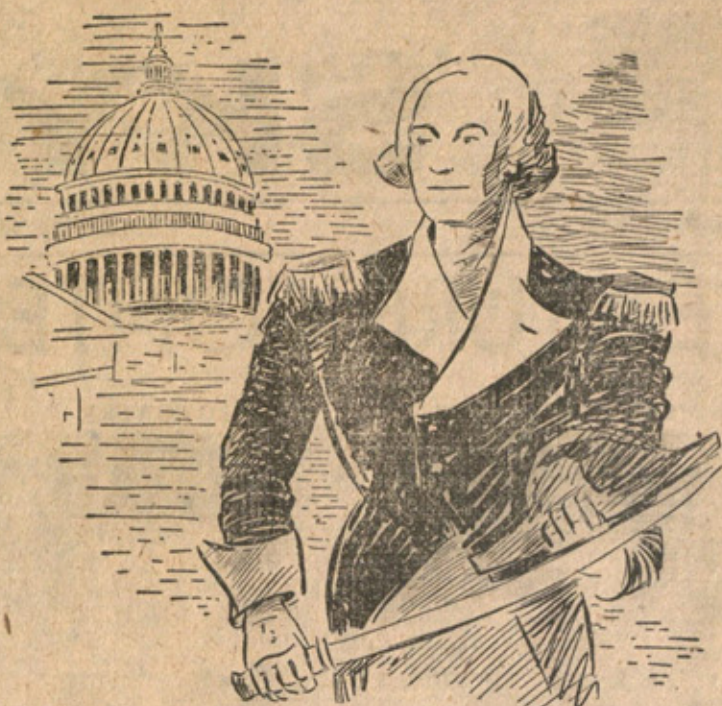

## FORGIVENESS

There is much teaching concerning forgiveness in the word of God. Of course if we were only commanded once to forgive, that would be sufficient. Our own forgiveness depends upon our being willing to forgive others—"for if ye forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you; but if ye forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses." Matt. 6:14, 15. If we expect to be forgiven we must learn to forgive. Hence, we can see the vast importance of this subject.

Our Lord teaches us to be willing to forgive over and over again. Peter once asked if he should forgive his brother seven times. Jesus replied, "Until seventy times seven." In Luke 17:4 Jesus said, "And if he trespass against thee seven times in a day and seven times in a day turn again to thee saying, 'I repent: thou shalt forgive him.'"

Sometimes the attitude is expressed by some: "Well, I'll forgive, but I'll not forget." Just suppose God maintained this attitude toward our sins and failures. "All have sinned and come short of the glory of God." If God felt this way toward our sins, who would be able to stand? Paul exhorts us to forgive one another "even as God hath for Christ's sake forgiven you" Eph. 4:32.

During this school year mistakes have been made and will be made. We are human, we all make mistakes. It is easy to make a mistake, but it takes courage to say "I have sinned." However when one does acknowledge his sin and asks our forgiveness we must be willing to forgive. Remember our own forgiveness is involved in this. Paul says "If a brother be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such an one in the spirit of meekness; considering thyself lest thou also be tempted." Gal. 6:1. I think we have too often emphasized the first part of this verse and neglected the last part. When a brother acknowledges his sin, it is so easy for us to stand off and say, "Why, I wouldn't have ever dreamed of doing a thing like that. That's just terrible." Paul says consider thyself. If we place ourselves in that brother's place, under his circumstances, we might even do worse than he. We might not know all the facts of the case, but Jesus

One of the greatest blots on the page of our modern history is the prodigality of today's youth. It was reported in 1951 that 27.4 percent of the major crimes were committed by youths under 21 years old. The predominant age among persons arrested was 21. Young people of our age have fallen into a state of disrepute. There is no small concern among our national, state and city officials about the rise in delinquency among the youth. This does not mean that there are no upright young people but the point is that some have come to despise our youth. It is not impossible for people to classify us with the despised younger generation. Paul instructed Timothy to let no man despise his youth.

Some seem to have the idea that the way to keep others from despising their youth is to blindly assert that they are of full maturity and go about to prove that by engaging in activities which are considered by them as "manly". Some of these "manly" deeds are drinking, swearing, gambling and vile living. In trying to prove to the world that they are not to be considered as inferior they have caused themselves to be classified with the despised youth.

Paul didn't forget to give Timothy the formula by which he would be able to carry out the instructions to cause "no man to despise thy youth". Paul told him to be a pattern or example in word, in charity, in spirit and in purity. We can have that honorable reputation which Christian youth should have by this formula. Let us live so that there can not be found a despicable word to say against us.

Christ knows. He understands. "He was tempted in all points like as we are, yet without sin." We ought to be careful then lest we draw a cloak of self-righteousness about ourselves like the Pharisee who said, "God, I thank thee that I am not as other men." Rather we should be like the publican who prayed, "God be merciful to me a sinner." We all need the mercy of God, and we must be willing to extend mercy and forgiveness to our fellow-men. Let us learn to forgive and become more and more like Jesus.
