Dixon Flies To Japan To Speak For Tokyo Church Fellowship, Plans To Include Visit To Ibaraki College

President H. A. Dixon will leave the F.H.C. campus November 13, to attend the Far East Church of Christ Fellowship to be conducted at the Yoyogi-Hachiman Church of Christ in Tokyo, Japan.

Leaving Memphis at 12:40 a.m. November 13, he will arrive in Los Angeles the following night. He will leave Los Angeles either Tuesday (November 14) or Wednesday (November 15) and arrive in Japan two days later.

Beginning November 19 and continuing through the 24th, services will be held each evening from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. in the Yoyogi-Hachiman church building. Brother Dixon will present his sermons on "The Church" each night at 8:00. M. D. Smith of Johnson Air Base will conduct the singing and George Gorganus of Tokyo will be in charge of program coordination.

On Thanksgiving day, lectures will be given by the Far East Church of Christ missionaries on the theme of "Fulfilling the Great Commission." Speakers for this occasion are: Richard Baggett of Ibaraki Christian College, Haskil Chesshir of Seoul, Korea; Charles Butler, Naha, Okinawa, W. W. Harris of Tachikawa Air Base and Bill Carroll of Tokyo.

The day services will be concluded with a song service and a sermon by Brother Dixon.

The Yoyogi-Hachiman congregation has about 20 members in regular attendance. Dick Tyle and Claude Nichol are the main leaders at the present.

Other GI churches which are active in spreading the gospel are Johnson Air Base, with 20 members, Tachikawa with 50 members and Grand Height with 15 members and Yokohama, 30 members.

Last year the Far East Fellowship meeting was conducted by James Bales, evangelist, debater and professor of Harding College. Other speakers include Haskil Chesshir, Chaplain Edwin Mankin and Captain Edwin Tester.

The trip will be made in a minimum of time with no opportunity for sightseeing. However Brother Dixon will go to Ibaraki Christian College where he has been invited to speak to the student body through an interpreter.

"I'm looking forward with a great deal of anticipation to meeting with brethren in a foreign country," states Brother Dixon, "with hope of some fruit in that part of the world."

DISHONOREST THOU GOD?

The Jews were so eternally proud that the law had been given to them. That gave them advantage "first of all that they were intrusted with the oracles of God." (Romans 3:2). And, you may feel assured, they GLORIED in that well known fact—yet TRANSGRESSED the law! However, such conduct did not escape the careful scrutiny of the Holy Spirit. "Thou therefore that teachest another, teachest thou not thyself?" (Romans 2:21.) In effect, are you such prodigious hypocrites that you condemn others for doing the very things you practice? "Thou who gloriest in the law, through thy transgression of the law dishonorest thou God? For the name of God is blasphemed among the Gentiles, because of you, even as it is written." (Romans 2:23, 24). Do you (who boast of having the law) actually DISHONOR God by transgressing that law? The Gentiles are BLASPHEMING the name of God—BECAUSE OF YOU!

That is stinging language which cuts to the heart. Israel gloried in the law, but disobeyed it, and the Apostle said it caused God's name to be blasphemed among the Gentiles. They were heathens. But they observed the moral turpitude of the Jews. After seeing the corrupt way they lived, Gentiles could have little or no respect for the Jews' religion. They blasphemed the name of God because of that and Paul did not hesitate to relate it!

As the non-Christian looks upon sectarian parties bickering and warring continually, he must wonder what kind of God authorizes such. If the name of God was blasphemed by watchful Gentiles, how much more must the denominations cause onlookers to think Christianity is not Divine! The Gentiles mistake was in thinking that God endorsed the sinful actions of the Jews; he did not. (Romans 3:9.) And it is a mistake to think He authorized the factions of religion; he did not. (Galatians 5:20.) But that does not keep the abuse from flowing.

Think about your own manner of life. DISHONOREST THOU GOD? "Or know ye not that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit which is in you, which ye have from God? And ye are not your own; for ye were bought with a price: glorify God there-
