We will be burdened with the responsibilities of a family, job and incidentals that as yet rest on the shoulders of others. In view of this, then, rejoice! "Let thy heart cheer thee in the days of thy youth." We should make a great effort to enjoy these days. We may look back in a few years and yearn for "the good old days." Let us determine at the suggestion of Solomon to enjoy our youth, especially this 58-59 school year. An all-out effort on the part of each can make it most pleasant.

## God's Approval

This joy must be controlled, however. Notice that Solomon said, "But know thou, that for all these things God will bring thee into judgment." Anything we do for fun must be within the realm of God's approval. Too often we hold the idea that everyone should have a "fling" in

their youth and then settle down to righteousness. To the contrary, all of our open and secret actions will be brought into judgment. "So then each one of us shall give account of himself to God." (Rom. 14:12)

Let's rephrase Solomon's advice: have fun in your youth, but let that fun be done in righteousness.

May this school year be the best.
