455 Enroll For 59-60 Session

All previous enrollment records were broken at Freed-Hardeman College when enrollment closed September 28. The new record is four hundred and fifty-five students from twentythree states and five foreign countries.

Registration began on September 9, 1959. The Freshman class, which is the largest ever, has a total of two hundred and ninety-three students, while the Sophomore class has one hundred and thirty-five students. The third year students number nineteen and there are eight special students.

Bible majors rank first, with a total of one hundred and ohe men, while business majors run close behind with one hundred. Third were the educational majors with a total of ninety-six. Liberal arts majors number sixty-seven, while pre-professional majors come in fifth with fifty students. The two smallest groups are the home economics and physical education majors with twenty-three and eighteen respectively.

Twenty-three states and five foreign countries are represented this year.

These students come from the following states and foreign countries: Alabama, Arkansas, California, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia, Wisconsin, Singapore, New Zealand, Okinawa, South Africa and Iran.

ABOUT OUR COACH

Around the campus this year we see many new people, some of whom are teachers. But one of our "new" teachers is very

familiar to second and third year students. He is Dick Stewart, coach of the college basketball team and teacher of Physical Education. The latter of these positions is the one that makes him "new" to our campus.

As for the coaching position, we at Freed-Hardeman have one of the best in the business. Having been a coach for many years, Mr. Stewart is well qualified in the all important field of experience. "Coach" Stewart started his coaching as a high school mentor. While teaching and coaching at Chester County High School for five seasons, his teams won the district championships four of these years. Grandest of all, however, was 1932, when they went all the way to a State Championship.

Then in 1934, "Coach" taught history and began coaching basketball at Freed-Hardeman. Great success followed. In the following six years, his teams were never beaten on their home floor and had an overall wonlost record of 130-15 respectively. During this period "Coach" Stewart's team won a Mississippi Valley Conference Championship. In this conference, his teams either won or came in second every year.

Of course, having this much success required some outstanding stars. One such example was Willie Hudson, who is now coach at Linden High School. Linden won three consecutive State Championships and went to the State Tournament five consecutive years. Hudson was also selected as coach for the South in the annual North-

South High School All-Star game in 1956.

Athletic Department of George Pepperdine College and the University of Southern California. Kerby Farrell, a Henderson resident, also played under Coach Stewart. Farrell has been a very successful baseball mana-

ger, having one year in the

During Stewart's first period of coaching, two national records were set. On January 11, 1938, Jim Murdaugh scored 78 points in one game, which stood as a national record until February, 1940, when Ulyss Brock scored 83 points.

All of this resulted in a "Stewart Coached" FHC team being ranked third in the South by the Commercial Appeal. The same year, 1935, the Nashville Banner declared his team the best in Tennessee. And "believe it or not", in 1938 his ability and team's record gained them a place in Ripley's "Believe It Or Not".

Dick Stewart coached at Freed-Hardeman until 1943 when Intercollegiate Sports were dropped during the war. He returned to the local scene in 1955 and has not had a losing season since then, providing exciting teams every year.

Coach Stewart has not only been a successful basketball coach, but in his athletic life, there have been 12 years of professional baseball and a period as football coach at Freed-Hardeman. He never had a losing season. He is also a very successful business man, manag-
