In Daniel 3:1 we read: "Nebuchadnezzar the king made an image of gold, whose height was threescore cubits, and the breadth thereof six cubits; he set it up in the plain of Dura, in the province of Babylon." Furthermore the king gave a commandment "that at what time ye hear the sound of . . . all kinds of music, ye fall down and worship the golden image . . . and whosoever falleth not down and worshippeth shall the same hour be cast into the midst of a burning fiery furnace." (verses 5 and 6). Before long word came to the king that certain Jews, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, did not regard the king's command. He had them brought before him and said "but if ye worship not, ye shall be cast the same hour into the midst of a burning fiery furnace; and who is that god that shall deliver you out of my hands?" (verse 15) They did not wait until the music played to give their answer but let it be known they would worship God only. Then Nebuchadnezzar full of fury had them cast into the furnace heated seven times its normal heat. God did not let His servants die. He saved them from the furnace. When the king saw the power of God, he commanded that no man speak evil of the God of these three because "no other god . . . is able to deliver after that sort." (verse 29)

Now look to the New Testament. In Matthew 27, Pilate delivered Jesus to the Jews to be killed even though he knew Him to be righteous and confessed Him to be worthy of no punishment.

In answering a question concerning the differences in his home land and our country, Peter Merrick said, "There are so many contrasts between the two countries that it seems as if it were almost two different worlds. Every way you turn things are different—the eating, the talking, the money, and the custom. The language is difficult for me (Ed. note: They speak English in New Zealand) and especially the slang expressions."

Peter was born in Tauranga, New Zealand eighteen years ago, but now finds himself in the second of his two worlds. At Freed-Hardeman Peter finds his studies about average to that in New Zealand. He says the subject matter is different but really no difficulties due to the difference of the countries.

He intends to continue his studies at Freed-Hardeman College for two years and then is undecided about his further education. He may enroll in one of our sister colleges or may return to New Zealand University.

At home Peter participated in football (not our kind of football, but the shin-kicking kind) and in track, especially sprinting. The sports he has seen on our campus are somewhat different to that which he was used to but he still finds them very interesting and very enlightening.

While in school Peter has mainly stuck to studying, meeting people and doing some preaching by appointment. His comment about Freed-Hardeman was that the atmosphere of the college was something that was unusual to him and that he was thankful for it.
