Business Leaders And Future Teachers Win High Honors At State Convention

Lawson, Jennings Get Top Honors

Honors were brought to FHC by six Phi Beta Lambda delegates and their sponsor Walker Whittle when they attended the sixth annual convention in Nashville March 17 and 18.

The six delegates chosen by a committee of club members were Bill Jennings, Jo Ann Lawson, Hope Barnett, Wanda Carden, James Willis and Linda Dean.

In the spotlight at the convention were the Mr. and Miss Future Business Executive contests. In both these, FHC scored number one position when the judges selected Bill Jennings as Mr. Future Business Executive and Jo Ann Lawson as Miss Future Business Executive.

Hope Barnett was chosen as a candidate for college Vice-President and was elected to that office. In the public speaking contest Hope received first place for her speech, "Youth and Responsibility".

Linda Dean was the successful candidate for West State Representative.

Entering the state vocabulary contest of business terms were Wanda Carden, Jo Ann Lawson and Linda Dean. Wanda placed second with Jo Ann and Linda tying for first place.

A chapter report prepared by FHC chapter reporter, Treva Tyree, was rated as third best at the convention.

There were twenty-two schools at the convention. However, only two were colleges, FHC and Owens College of Memphis. "We hope to create more interest on the college level through our west state representative," said Mr. Whittle.

Debate Team Rated Excellent

Jack Medlin and Jerry Fulkerson were rated excellent in debate when they, Elmer Howell and Dennis Bailey competed with about 50 schools at the Southern Speech Association Forensic Tournament at Winston-Salem, North Carolina, April 4 through 6.

The tournament was held at the Robert E. Lee Hotel in Winston-Salem, which is 1,000 miles from Henderson. Monday night, they were the guests of Wake Forest College at a production of "J. B.", the Broadway play based on the book of Job.

The expenses for this tournament where our teams participated in extemporaneous speaking, oratory, after-dinner speeches and interpretative reading, were paid from the sale of chorus records.

Jerry Fulkerson, a member of the team receiving excellent rating in debate, was also rated superior at the Magnolia Speech Tournament in Columbus, Mississippi.

High School Day, March 18, was proclaimed a big success by W. A. Bradfield, Public Relations Director. High school juniors and seniors, their parents, teachers, friends, and alumni spent the day on the campus of FHC for its annual High School Day.

Highlights for the day's activities included tours of the campus, general assembly during which W. A. Bradfield spoke on "Education for the Space Age", and the college chorus presented a program under the direction of Kelly B. Doyle. A general information session was

conducted by Dean E. Claude Gardner, which included a panel discussion under the direction of Brad Brumley. The main speech of the day was "Research Contributions by the Allied Health Professions", by Dr. S. D. Feurt of the University of Tennessee Medical Units.

Approximately 400 visitors from nine different states were present for the occasion.

Much prestige was gained for the school by the great success of the activities of this year's High School Day.

Drive For Funds Begins

The fund raising drive for the expansion of the campus at FHC is moving ahead. Organizations have been established in Memphis, Jackson, Lawrenceburg, Alamo, Bells, and Lexington, Tennessee; Florence, Alabama; Corinth, Tupelo, Columbus, and Jackson, Mississippi; Mayfield, Paducah, and Benton, Kentucky and other places.

On April 1, a banquet was held in the Student Center at Freed-Hardeman. Three hundred fifteen tickets to this banquet were sold to the citizens of Henderson at \$10 per plate in order to raise money for the expansion program. At the banquet many of those present gained a better insight into the work of the college through the several speeches and the performance of the college chorus.

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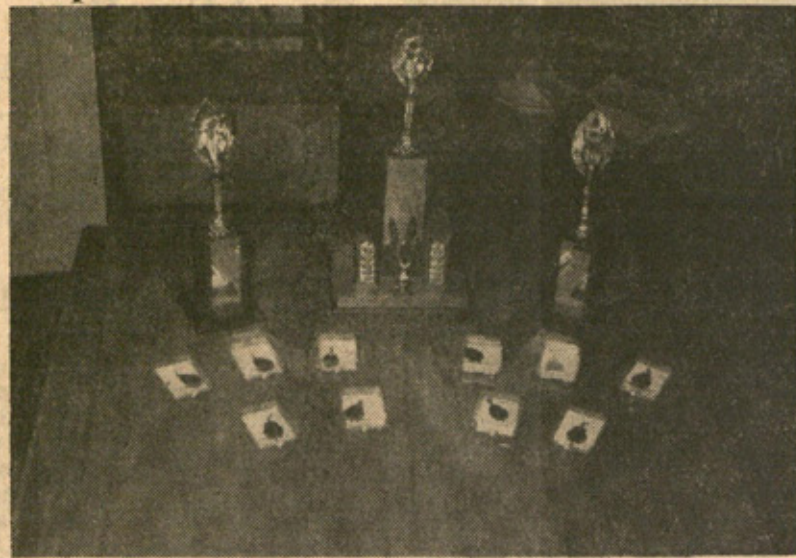
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Trophies To Be Given
