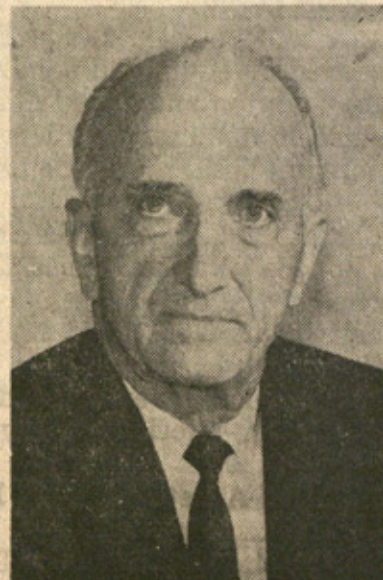

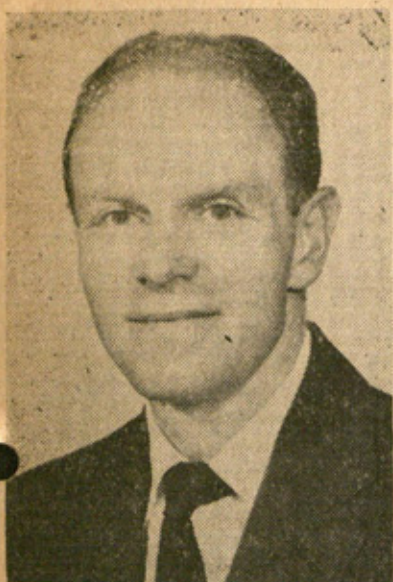

Girl's second place winner was Ruby Peterson, Patsy Goodner, third, and Alice Ray Watson, fourth, all Sigma Rhos.

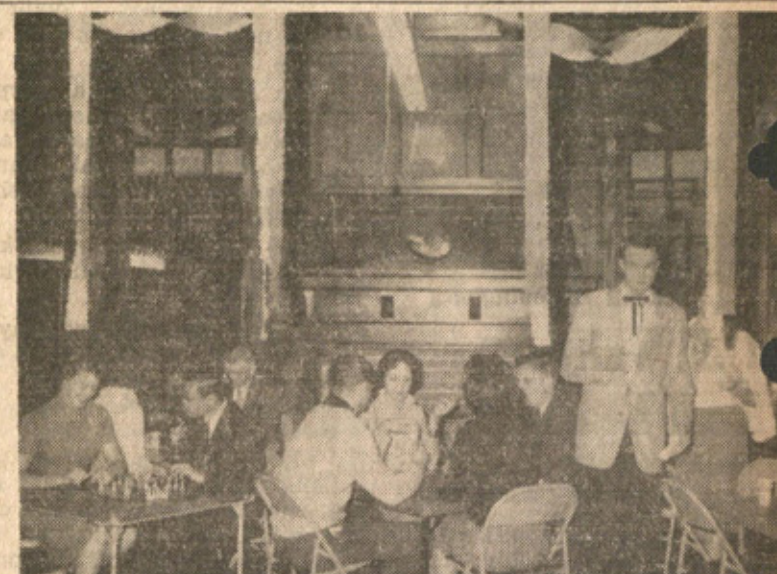
