Hardeman—ganized and launched a neschool superseding the already burgeoning Georgia Robertson Christian College. They erected the present administration building in 1907 and in the autumn of '08 began operation as the National Teachers' Normal and Business College.

In addition to giving the beginning date of the construction of the college, the building committee and the architect are listed. F. D. Johnson, J. G. Hardeman, and John McDonald composed the erection board and one H. T. McGee was the architect.

The inscription on the walkway is "N.T.N. and B. College— 1908."
