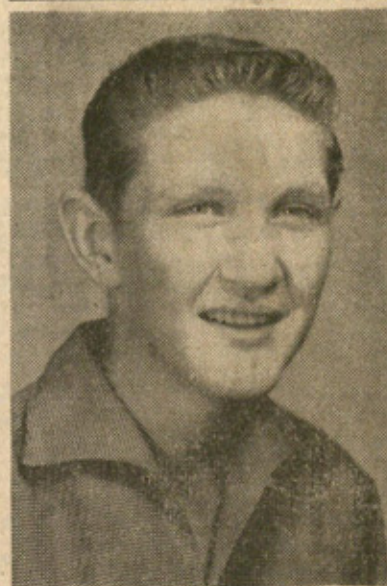

As winner, Jerry received an award plaque and a trip to the state tournament.

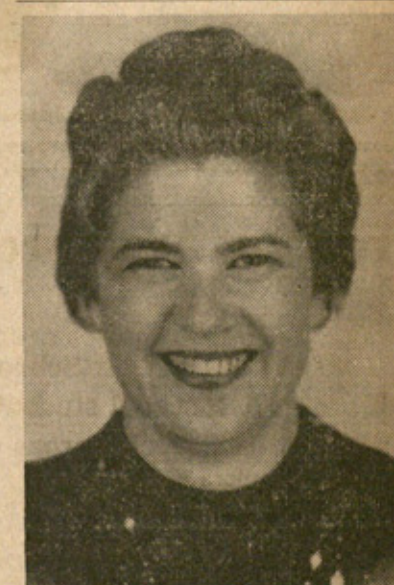

Two other good books that I want to comment on are Douglas' "The Big Fisherman" and "Language in Action" by S. I. Hayakawa. The former has been made into a popular movie. The latter has won accolades from two of the most renowned philologists in America. Wilfred Funk, helmsman of Funk and Wagnalls publishing house and conductor of the "It Pays to Increase Your Word Power" feature in the "Reader's Digest", as well as nationally recognized linguist Norman Lewis have applauded "Language in Action" as an easily-understood book on semantics.

State Official Visits Language Department

Mrs. Sara Whitten, Supervisor of Curriculum and Instruction in the field of Modern Foreign Languages in Tennessee, was recent guest of the Modern Language Department at Freed-Hardeman College.

In presenting her to the student body, Mrs. Ruth Campbell, Chairman of Modern Language Department at FHC, pointed out some of Mrs. Whitten's qualifications for her present post. She had been for 14 years previous to January 1, 1960 a member of the faculty at David Lipscomb College in Nashville. Mrs. Campbell stated that Mrs. Whitten is quite well-known throughout Middle Tennessee as a TV personality, having served as a regular panel member on the Know-Your-Bible Quiz Program on a Nashville station for the past seven years. She has been abroad and has studied at McGill University in Canada.

In her present work with the Tennessee Department of Education, she is encouraging the various schools in the state to start foreign language study earlier and to continue it for a longer period, ideally ten years.
